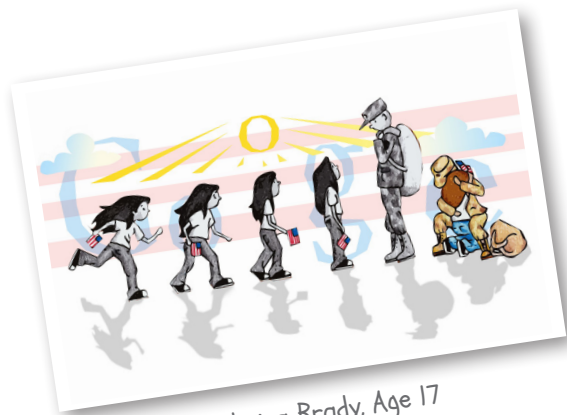
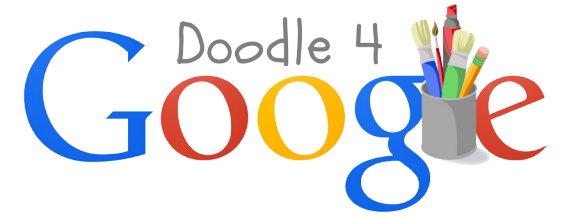

## Quick Guide

## Judging and Prizes

### Judging

The Doodle 4 Google competition is open to all students in grades K-12 in the United States. Doodles will be judged in five grade groups on a state-by-state basis.

### Grade Groups

Grades 4-5

Grades 6-7

Grades 8-9

Grades 10-12

### One (1) National Winner

The National Winner will have his or her doodle featured on the U.S. Google.com homepage. He or she will be awarded a \$30,000 college scholarship, a trip to Mountain View, California for the final awards ceremony on May 21, 2014, a Google Chromebook computer, a Nexus 7 tablet, and a t-shirt printed with his or her doodle on it. We'll also award the winner's full-time school a \$50,000 Google for Education technology grant.

### Four (4) National Finalists

Each of the other four National Finalists will win a \$5,000 college scholarship, a trip to Mountain View, California for the final awards ceremony on May 21, 2014, a Nexus 7 tablet, and a t-shirt printed with their doodle on it.

### Fifty (50) State Winners

Each of the other 50 State Winners will win a trip to Mountain View, California for the final awards ceremony on May 21, 2014, a Nexus 7 tablet, and a t-shirt printed with their doodles on it.

### Two Hundred and Fifty (250) State Finalists

Each of the other State Finalists will receive an official winner's certificate and be featured on the Doodle 4 Google contest website.



## Entry Guidelines

### Title and Supporting Statement

In addition to creating a doodle, students also need to:

- Title their doodle
- Write a supporting statement no more than 50 words long. Students should explain how their doodle portrays the theme "If I Could Invent One Thing to Make the World a Better Place..."

### Submitting Entries

All entries must be received by **March 20th, 2014**.

- Electronic submissions must be received by 11:59pm EST.
- Mail submissions must be received at either of the below addresses by Thursday March 20, 2014.

- Entries received after March 20, 2014 will not be counted.
- Please note that each entry form requires a parent signature. Any doodles without a parent or guardian's signature will be disqualified.
- You may bulk upload entries on our website or mail multiple entries in the same envelope. Just make sure to submit only one Doodle per student.

### Rules

- The doodle must be original artwork.
- Any doodles featuring copyrighted or trademarked logos or images will be disqualified.
- Students do not have to draw directly on the template found on our website, but the Google logo should be clearly visible.
- The doodles can be hand drawn using any art supplies, or can be created using computer drawing software on the computer.
- We cannot accept 3D entries.
